Rather than hanging around the streets of Aviemore, shivering, I decided to go birding in the mountains even though I carried no binoculars, nor optics of any description.


Very soon, I encountered a serious and expert birder who promptly introduced me to a bird that I had never seen before and have never seen since.


Perched in splendid isolation on a shrub protruding from the snow was, wait for it . . . a Lesser Grey Shrike!

The purpose of this tale is a roundabout way of reporting that by arrangement with Cairngorm Travel, the Lincolnshire Bird Club will (as previously posted in our website Forum), be heading to the Scottish Highlands between January 14-18 next year.

It is one of the best value birding holidays on the market and includes:

- * Coach trip to and from Kingussie, with pick-ups in Grimsby, Cleethorpes, Lincoln and possibly, depending on demand, Louth and or Brigg/Scunthorpe
- * Four nights at the Duke of Gordon Hotel, with five-course candlelit evening meals and full Scottish breakfasts
- * Live evening entertainment





The price of the holiday: £259 each for two persons sharing a room. There is a single person supplement - but this is waived for the first 10 singles to make a booking (note - these tend to get snapped up quickly).

For the third consecutive year, the holiday is being put on by the Lincolnshire Bird Club's partners, Goole-based company Cairngorm Travel (01405 761334), through whom all bookings need to be made.

BTO Winter Gull Survey

The Winter Gull Survey collects information about our wintering gull populations, through the coordinated effort of volunteer surveyors across the UK.

- Visit the WinGS Vacant Site Map to view and request sites in your area.
- The Key Date for Autumn 2024 surveys is September 29th.
- Counts can be conducted a week before and after, as close to this key date as possible.

In winter, gulls flock together to roost communally on lakes, reservoirs and estuaries, in groups that can reach the thousands.

The Winter Gull Survey (WinGS) will run over the winters of 2023/24 and 2024/25 to collect updated information on the numbers and distributions of these wintering gulls in the UK, the Channel Islands and the Isle of Man. Surveys will also run in autumn 2024 in order to monitor gulls at post breeding aggregations and capture seasonal peaks of species on passage from breeding to wintering locations.

WinGS volunteers visit gull roost sites, counting six key species: Black-headed Gull, Common Gull, Mediterranean Gull, Lesser Black-backed Gull, Herring Gull and Great Black-backed Gull. These gulls are all of conservation concern, and their breeding populations are either Amber- or Red-listed in the UK.

Gathering more detailed information about wintering populations, and which roost sites they rely on, will help us protect them and develop more effective conservation strategies.

County wildlife trust sounds note of concern on proposed revamp of former theme park

THE Lincolnshire Wildlife
Trust has lodged what it
describes as a 'holding
objection' to plans to
redevelop the former
Pleasure Island theme park
in Cleethorpes.

It says elements of the project would bring disturbance to the Buck Beck waterway (pictured) which bisects the redevelopment site.

The Horncastle-based trust has identified as being at



particular risk two butterfly species - the Small Heath and the Wall - both of which have been recorded within a short radius.

Says its planning consultant, James Wood: "The Trust wishes to register a holding objection, and recommends the applicant undertake a series of dedicated monthly surveys, encompassing the key period of April to October, to determine presence or absence of these species within the proposed development boundaries."

The Buck Beck, which is classed as a river, is also a noted habitat for Kingfishers, Reed Warblers, Sedge Warblers, Little Egrets and other wading birds.

These would also face disturbance, especially from the proposal by the applicants - a consortium of developers - to site holiday lodges and an adventure play park close to its banks.

Continues Dr Wood: "We hold reservations over the proposed layout which would be likely to lead to ongoing regular disturbance to the Buck Beck and its associated function as a wildlife corridor."

"The Trust would, therefore, recommend the addition of perimeter fencing to Buck Beck to offer a degree of physical segregation, reducing direct disturbance such as noise and artificial lighting."

The Pleasure Island redevelopment proposal is currently under consideration by North East Lincolnshire Council planners with little likelihood of being determined before the end of this year.

Getting to know Eric Simms at the BTO Archives

In August 2024, I had the exciting opportunity of volunteering in the BTO Archives at the Nunnery in Thetford. The Archives house a wide variety of documents, data, and photographs relating to the history and activities of BTO and the wider world of British ornithology. Over the last two years, BTO Archivist Lesley Hindley has worked tirelessly to improve the accessibility of the BTO Archives and to encourage and to enable the use of archival research methods within the field of ornithology.

As a recent history graduate with only a surface-level understanding of birds from my previous visits to BTO, the ever-growing collection of personal papers from prominent birders drew my attention. I am currently pursuing

a career in archives and record management, and thanks to Lesley this placement has nurtured and reaffirmed my enthusiasm, while providing me with a comprehensive overview of what it means to be an archivist and adding substance to my CV.

Cataloguing Eric Simms' personal papers


During my two weeks at the Nunnery, my primary project was cataloguing the personal papers of Eric Simms. The papers had been kindly donated to BTO by Simms' son David in 2022, following his father's passing in 2009. Eric Simms was a renowned ornithologist, naturalist, and broadcaster whose career began as a wildlife sound recordist and as the BBC's resident 'Bird Man', succeeding Dr Ludwig Koch. Simms would go on to present and

produce countless radio and TV broadcasts, pioneering nature recording through the use of portable recorders, parabolic sound reflectors, radio links, and hydrophones. I spent a few days sifting through Simms' intricately scrapbooked press records, photographs, and personal letters as well as his ecological research. The meticulous detail in which Simms had recorded both his professional and personal life and interactions with his peers meant that I soon began to feel personally invested with the documents, experiencing the highs of his achievements, and the lows of his tragedies.

I am now proud to say that Simms' personal papers are catalogued and available to researchers and that his legacy has been preserved for future generations!

After I had completed the cataloguing process, I curated a display based on the archive



collection of Eric Simms which you can currently visit at the exhibition space at the Nunnery. I enjoyed deciding how pieces would fit together to form a narrative around Simms' ornithological achievements.

I am now proud to say that Simms' personal papers are catalogued and available to researchers and that his legacy has been preserved for future generations!

Learning about archives

With Lesley's guidance I worked out a structure with which to organise the Simms collection into a hierarchy made up of fonds, series, and items in line with the ISAD(G) archival cataloguing standard. It took some trial and error to neatly house everything and even then, I had a 'miscellaneous' section given the eclectic range of content within Simms' papers. Using the cataloguing software Soutron, it is now clearly ordered and accessible on the BTO's Archive catalogue.

As well as some of the theoretical aspects of archiving, Lesley taught me some of the practical skills I will need for a career in archives. I re-boxed collections using safe handling techniques and conservation principles. I even dabbled in environmental monitoring (only at BTO would you get employees excited at the prospect of finding bugs!). I also got to clean and repackage some of the vast collection of Oliver G. Pike's early bird photography lantern slides and supervise a researcher who was using the Archives.

Taking my experience forward

My time with BTO has confirmed to me the importance of heritage and of archives, not only in cultural preservation but also in ecological research. I would highly recommend getting in touch with Lesley Hindley and BTO (archives@bto.org) if you are interested in work experience in the library/archive field. Given that the BTO Archives are still in their early days, there is lots of useful in person volunteering YOU could contribute. Lesley is an excellent teacher and the skills I developed and the opportunities I had to gain first-hand experience have been key in giving me the confidence to move onto the next step of my career. Now that I have returned to London, I miss the serene landscape of the Nunnery and hope to return for a visit soon.

Review: The Bird Book - The Stories, Science and History of Birds

IT is fair to say that ornithological literature has no equivalent of The Bible - nor ever will do.

Well done, then, to publishing house DK for making an ambitious stab at it with The Bird Book - The Stories, Science and History of Birds.

It a most impressive and comprehensive publication, resulting from collaboration between a large team of expert writers (including Lincolnshire's Josh Jones), artists, illustrators, photographers, historical researchers and editors.

The book is always authoritative but never dull - in fact, each of its glossy 300-plus pages is seldom less than vibrant and entertaining

The jargon-free text examines every aspect of the science of birds - from feeding behaviour to migration and from anatomy to courtship and breeding.

It then goes on to explore how, in many different ways, birds have influenced the development of human civilisation – for instance,

painting, music, pottery, embroidery, literature, postage stamp design, cuisine and much else.

But coming back to The Bible, those who remember their religious education lessons at school will know that the Holy scriptures contain numerous references to birds, with many species subsequently becoming icons of Christian and other religions.

The most notable, of course, is the white dove, representing the Holy Spirit.

With Christmas approaching, The Bird Book would make an excellent gift for adults and older children alike.




